

HALEI HEINZEL NAMED THE 77TH WISCONSIN ALICE IN DAIRYLAND



Halei Heinzel, a recent graduate from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with a degree in Life Sciences Communication., was recently named the 77th Wisconsin Alice in Dairyland. Heinzel did not grow up on a Wisconsin farm, however she was in FFA during her high school years and is a graduate of the UW Farm and Industry Short Course with certificates in Agribusiness Management and Dairy Farm Management. Halei will begin serving as Wisconsin's Alice in Dairyland on July 8, 2024.

Even though not raised on a farm, Halei gained real farm experience by working at Mesa Normandes. Mesa Dairy is owned by NANA members Patrick and Carrie Mess and Halei owns a Normande heifer the Mess's bred. As the owner of Mesa Uno Dolly, Halei exhibited her at the 2023 Wisconsin State Fair and at the 2023 National Normande Show. The entire NANA community congratulates Halei on her new role as Wisconsin's Alice in Dairyland!

CLASSIFICATION REPEAT

Dennis and Suzanne Jones, White Gold Cattle Company, of Stewartsville, MO, and Nathan and Tajia Retzlaff, Rayoli's Normandes of Century Farm near Seymour, WI, classified their Normandes in November of 2023. Once again the two dairy producers utilized the Brown Swiss Association's official classification program to have their Normande cows evaluated for type and the results were positive for both herds.

The major dairy breeds in the United States have some form of classification program for their members so milking females within their breeds can be evaluated for type based upon what that breed has determined to be the ideal appearing female in the breed. The individuals who do the classifying are employed by their respective breed associations. They are well-trained individuals who meet and train together on a regular basis to ensure the quality and uniformity of their work in the program. Breeders use the classification information for breeding and marketing purposes.

The Brown Swiss Association's classification scorecard has five major breakdowns upon which a cow is evaluated. They are as follows. 1-Body strength and rump at 15%. 2-Dairy quality at 15%. 3-Rump at 10%. 4-Mobility (Feet & Legs) at 20%. And 5-Mammary system at 40%. The classifier looks at each individual cow he/she is classifying with the five major breakdowns and percentages in mind, and eventually comes up with a classification level and numerical score for each individual cow. The classification levels and scores that can be assigned are as follows.

Poor: 50-74 points. A cow classified at this level has some serious faults in her overall appearance, constitution, and mammary system.

Good: 75-79 points. A cow slightly better than one classified Poor, but still a sound and attractive appearance and functionality.

Good Plus: 80-84 points. A cow that is average looking in overall appearance and in mammary system. Many two year old cows initially score in this range and as they mature they may move up in their score to become Very Good or Excellent cows.

Very Good: 85-89 points. Cows scored Very Good are very functional cows and are above average in overall appearance. They will have sound feet and legs, a well attached mammary system, and are attractive to look at.

Excellent: 90-97 points. The goal of most breeders of registered dairy cattle is to breed and have milk cows who classify Excellent. An Excellent cow is not only very functional, but she is very attractive to look at with a very sound mammary system, and an eye catching general appearance. It is cows who are three years old or older who will be classified Excellent.



White Gold Cattle Company had a very good day when they classified their Normande cows. Their small herd of seven Normande cows comprising of one full blood, one three quarter blood, and five halfbloods had the following results: two Excellent and five Very Good. High light of the day was when White Gold Plum Pudding was scored Ex-92 and designated as 2E. The Jones's other excellent cow is White Gold Periwinkle. Both Excellent cows are sired by SGF Boot Scooter F74D. "Boot Scooter" was bred by Brian Toivola (Spruce Grove Farm) of Hibbing, MN. The maternal grand dam of Boot Scooter was Jextase (See following history story.), one of the original Normande females

imported into the United States. The other five White Gold cows are sired by French Normande bulls.

Retzlaff Century Farm near Seymour, WI, is the home of a 200 cow dairy herd that is milked three times per day and has a rolling herd average of over 30,000 pounds of milk per cow. The herd is a multi-colored herd consisting of black and white Holsteins, red and white Holsteins, Brown Swiss, Lineback, Guernsey, Normande, and Milking Shorthorns. Nine

cows with Normande genetics were classified with four cows scored as Very Good and five cows scored Good Plus. Of the nine cows scored, one was sired by the French bull Honess Isy and she was classified at Very Good 86. Two other cows were sired by Normande bulls bred by Barbara Wogsland of Wisconsin. A daughter of New Hope Saintyorre Uno-Et classified at Good Plus 84. And a daughter of New Hope Telerama Riley-ET scored Good Plus 81 as a young cow. Her two year old incomplete milk record is currently 2-0 265d 21,451m 872f 669p.

NANA encourages its breeders to gather performance and evaluation information on their Normandes and submit that information to the NANA office so the performance of Normandes can be highlighted to those who have expressed an interest in the Normande breed. Classifying your cows is one of those pieces of information helpful in promoting the Normande breed.

A NEW NANA LOGO

In the early years after NANA was formed, it had on its stationary and business envelopes the logos you see below.



After NANA moved its office to 11538 Spudville Rd., Hibbing, MN, the Normande head became the identifying logo that was used by NANA in its promotional material and items until this day. In a recent conversation with Dr. Brian Toivola, it was learned that the head that was used was the head of a half-blood Normande.

With a fifty-year landmark and celebration in the works for the 2024 National Normande Show, NANA Board president Chris Conley felt NANA might want to consider a new logo for the Association. Brenda Conley and Sarah Vosberg had found a small company in Ohio owned by Eileen Gress, Grand Champion Designs, that created logos for businesses and organizations and she was offering a special discount at the time for the creation of a logo.

A special NANA Board meeting was called and after discussing it, the NANA Board authorized the signing of a contract with Grand Champion Designs to create a new logo for NANA. Sarah Vosberg and Brenda Conley were appointed to be the contact persons with Grand Champion Designs as they developed and created a new logo. The contract stated Grand Champion Designs would create a number of possible logos and the Board of Directors, Brenda, and Sarah would then provide Eileen Gress suggestions and input on shape, colors, etc. What you see below are the four designs NANA received per the contract and all four will be used by NANA in different areas, ie, stationary, clothing items, hats, promotional material, etc.

FIFTY YEARS FOR NORMANDES IN USA!

EDITOR'S NOTE: 2024 marks the fiftieth year Normandes have been in the United States. Normande Happenings will recognize this milestone with some United States Normande history in this newsletter and in the next two NANA newsletters. The American Normande historical information presented will be a combination of the written history of NANA and Normandes in the United States by Dr. Brian Toivola as found on NANA's website. The articles will also include additional historical information gleaned from a biographical paper submitted to the French Normande Association (Os Race Normande) for an award they were giving to Dr. Toivola in 2008. And the articles will include NANA history the editor of NANA's newsletter has been able to come across and historical information NANA individual members have provided. Enjoy and be enlightened!

PART TWO

In our first article we spoke of Samuel Barr of Kearney, MO, being one of the pioneers in introducing Normandes into the United States through importation. Barr and his son, Jack, (both are deceased) were very prominent registered Angus breeders. They were instrumental in establishing the American Normande Association (ANA) which eventually became the North American Normande Association. Some of the first Normande females imported went to the Barrs, and to make Normande genetics more available to beef producers, they did a good amount of embryo flushing with those females. They also bred a good number of their Angus cows to the Normande bulls whose semen had been imported with the females. In 1975 they held a production sale highlighting Normandes they had bred. The sale featured the first three-quarter blood Normande female ever to be offered at public auction. The items below are scanned from their sale catalog that Dr. Brian Toivola provided.

In our current digital age, such sales are often video sales over the internet. But in the late 1970's such sales were held on the farm with the chance of there being very little interest in what you are offering and/or poor weather. It is unknown what the prices were that the Barr's received during their sale, but they were not reluctant to take a risk in offering samples of a new breed they were actively promoting.

Another individual prominent in the early introduction of Normandes into the United States, and eventually the creation of the North American Normande Association, was Craig Ouverson near Hanlontown, IA. Ouverson had a 255 head beef cow herd, including 100 registered Chianina beef cattle. After selling his registered Chianina herd he imported nine Normande females from France in the mid to late 1970's. One of the females Ouverson imported was Jarre (A002761). She was born in France on 2-10-74 and according to her ANA registration papers she had an adjusted 205 day weaning weight of 558 pounds and an adjusted 365 yearling weight of 910. Her ANA registration paper was issued on 7-27-79.




Normande Happenings was made aware of Jarre's influence upon the breed in the United States by Bruce Bolen from Greentop, MO. Bruce and his two brothers, Ben and David, were some of the original members of NANA when NANA was formed and so they knew many of the breeders involved with the ANA. Bruce provided the information about Jarre that follows and considers her a queen mother of the Normande breed in the United States.

According to Bolen, Jarre had four sons and each one influenced Normande

genetics here in the United States. Three of her four known sons were sired by one of the bulls whose semen had been imported along with the live animals (See part 1 for pictures of those bulls.) The first son of Jarre was BPA John Boy

(A100002). "John Boy" was sired by Carmin (A000006) and was the result of an embryo transfer. BPA John Boy sired many sons who would gain four and five pounds per day in bull and steer performance tests in Iowa. One of the more influential daughters of "John Boy" was SGF JB'S Ebony 79X. "Ebony 79X" (see below) was the dam of SGF Polled Tradition who sired many sons and daughters that contributed much to the performance of Normandes in bull tests and steer evaluation contests. Another son was Spruce Grove Mr Ebony 79N who was used in the Dennis Knuth herd (Rocky Bottom Normandes) near Fall Creek, WI and in the Double M Cattle Company herd, also in WI.



John Boy, a 2,600 - pounds herd size at Brush Point Fants, is an embryo transplant from one of nine cross Craig Ouverson Imported from France. The bull is five years old.


JOHN BOY Does It Again!

Jarre's second influential son was sired by Largo (C000014-Canadian number) and was named BPA Mr Brush Point Bruce (A100014). Bolen Brothers (Bruce, Ben, and David) of Tama, IA, purchased this bull and used him quite extensively in the development of their herd. Bruce transmitted size and thickness to his offspring.


Jarre's third influential son was simply named Chester (A101094) without the Brush Point prefix. Chester's sire was Casier (A000007). Casier sons were very thick and muscular, and you will see his name in many pedigrees of Normandes from breeders who are raising their Normandes for beef purposes.

A fourth son of Jarre was BPA Brush Point Elmer (A100006). Elmer's sire was Capucin (A000004) and Elmer offspring possessed Jarre's size and Capucin's conformation, making them very desirable phenotypically.

Jarre did have one known daughter, BPA Jarre's Carentan (A101173). She was sired by Carentan (A000005).

Bruce Bolen concludes his comments about Jarre with these words: "In the 1970's and 1980's, Brush Point bred bulls dominated IBIA bull tests with the highest breed average rate of gain during the tests. I know there are other good genetics in our breed, but Jarre should be considered one of the best imported foundation females into the United States when progeny performance is considered."


Another early United States pioneer in the Normande breed was Jay Swisher and family of Groton, SD. They imported a number of females and the bull known as Norman I (A001000). According to Dr. Brian Toivola's history of the breed, the Swishers "quickly became the largest Normande breeder ever in the U.S. Their herd grew to 500 full blood, purebred and percentage Normande cows. Several bloodlines of full blood cattle currently registered by NANA go back to this outstanding herd, and the Barr herd as well."




There are three other imported females that we want to briefly highlight in this article. They were imported by the Swishers. The first is Lutece (A002816). She had two daughters, Lutece Two (A100966) and Lutece Three (A100967). Both of these daughters were sired by Captan (A002743) and they were in the Spruce Grove Farm herd of Dr. Brian Toivola.

The second imported female we want to mention is Jextase (A002814). Jextase had an embryo transfer daughter sired by Captan in the Brian Toivola herd (SGF) named Jextase Two-ET (A100965). Jextase Two-ET had a son sired by Diametre named SGF Diametre USA-ET F74G (A102191) who was semen collected and promoted as a bull for

individuals who were interested in Normandes for dairy purposes. Another son of Jextase Two-ET was SGF Boot Scooter F47D, the sire of two Excellent cows in the White Gold Cattle Company herd, Dennis and Suzanne Jones, Stewartsville, MO..







The third imported female is Lombarde (A002815). The only thing known about Lombarde is that she also went into the Jay Swisher herd.

In our next history installment we will briefly touch on the formation of NANA, the Swisher sale, and active promotion efforts of NANA under NANA's leadership during the mid-1980's through the 1990's.


